

DRAFT DISCIPLINE POLICY

SECTION 1. BEN FRANKLIN ACADEMY

MISSION

The mission of Ben Franklin Academy is to develop young adults with character like America's founding Renaissance man, Benjamin Franklin: well-read, scientifically curious, and civically engaged.

VISION

Our students will excel academically through a challenging, sequenced curriculum that emphasizes math, science, and literacy. We will be a data driven institution, focusing on individual students. Our students, teachers, parents, staff, and leaders will be held accountable for the success of our school. Finally, we recognize that an education is incomplete without fostering the arts, sports, nature, and character.

PURPOSE

Ben Franklin Academy (the Academy) seeks to build students with character following Benjamin Franklin's thirteen virtues. In doing so we will hold each student to a high standard of behavior to teach these character traits and to provide a constructive learning environment. This policy is also designed to ensure the safety of the staff and students. We recognize that children will misbehave and that clear expectations and consequences can help students appreciate and learn proper boundaries. This document purposefully does not spell out every behavior that will trigger a disciplinary action, nor does it spell out the consequence for every action. But it does provide general guidance regarding the academy's discipline philosophy and an approach to handling disciplinary issues.

SECTION 2. DISCIPLINARY ACTION

Disciplinary action must be consistently applied based on clear, simple standards. And in some situations disciplinary action may need to be tailored toward an individual student. To satisfy these oft-competing interests, students not adhering to expected student behavior or the DCSD Students Rights and Responsibilities will be subject to the consequence described in this policy.

EXPECTED STUDENT BEHAVIORS

The following behavior is expected from every student. Ben Franklin Academy students shall:

- Dress appropriately for school in accordance with the Uniform Policy.
- Arrive to class on time.

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- Be prepared.
- Walk in the hallways.
- Keep their hands, body, and objects to themselves.
- Be courteous and respectful toward all staff, students, and visitors.
- Leave gum and candy at home.
- Follow the Academy's technology agreement.
- Follow the rules. Unacceptable behaviors, such as those outlined below will be subject to disciplinary actions.

• Not posses a wireless communication device (cell phone, camera phone) that disrupts the educational process. The use of a cell phone during school hours in the absence of an emergency will be subject to disciplinary action. (Note: If students possess a cell phone, it must be turned off and kept out of sight inside a pocket, back pack, purse or similar container, and it may not be used or allowed to emit any ring tone or other noise on school grounds during school hours.)

MINOR PROBLEM BEHAVIORS

The following behaviors are considered minor and shall result in the consequence listed. A student behaving as indicated shall be referred to the office and a discipline slip shall be given that shall be taken home. Parental notification may occur with the discipline slip or an additional phone call. Consequences indicated with an (M) are mandatory and those indicated with a (P) are progressive. Progressive consequences can depend on the situation or recidivism of the behavior.

DETENTIONS

Detentions must be served either the day of the incident or the next school day after the incident is documented. Saturday Detention must be served on the assigned date. Failure to serve an assigned detention will result in a Saturday Detention. Failure to serve a Saturday Detention will result in a suspension. A sports practice, sports game, concert, play, or other personal commitments are not acceptable reasons to miss detention. During students will contribute to the betterment of their school. Duties may include cleaning up the lunchroom and/or other areas of the school, building, or grounds.

ACCOUNTABILITY

Students will be held accountable for their behavior. Study and review the Discipline Plan with your child. The understanding of these rules is important and will affect your child. We are confident that with your support our students will enjoy a learning environment where a high level of academic achievement can take place. When you review and reinforce these concepts at home, you are doing your part to increase your child's overall success.
